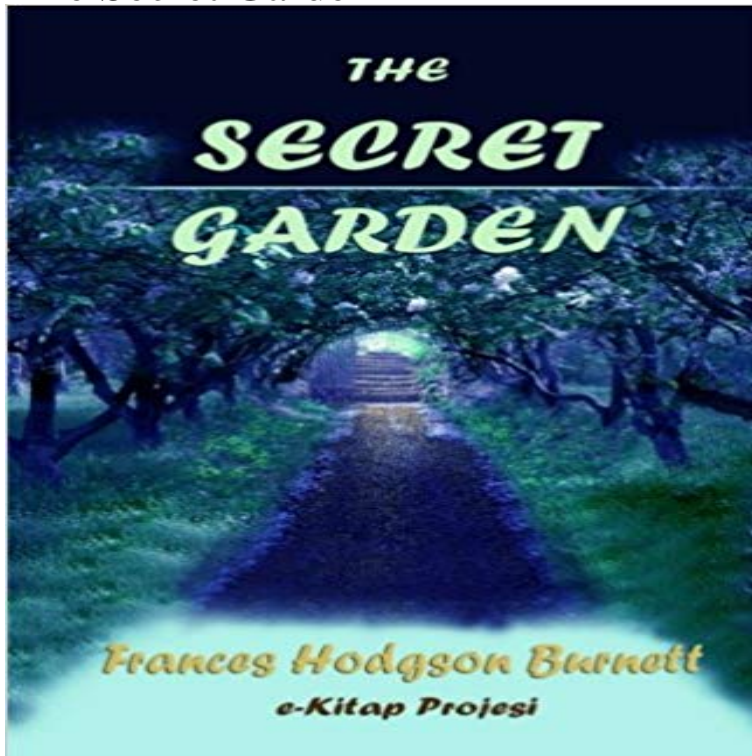


## The Secret Garden
